These advocacy scholarships are CANN's way of ensuring that their collective legacy lives on."

- The Thomas P. McCormick Advocacy Scholarship will be awarded annually to an advocate dedicated to improving access to care and treatment under Medicaid.
- The Gary R. Rose Advocacy Scholarship will be awarded annually to an advocate dedicated to improving access to care and treatment under the Ryan White CARE Act.
- The Honorable Maurice D. Hinchey Advocacy Scholarship will be awarded annually to an advocated dedicated to improving access to care and treatment under national and global health programs.

The advocacy scholarships will allow advocates to attend specific HIV/AIDS-related educational events.
